


From T-score to Wider Scoring Bands



- Students are less finely differentiated on the basis of every mark. Each subject will be scored using 8 Achievement Levels (ALs), with AL1 being the best.
- Students who demonstrate similar achievement for a subject will receive the same AL, regardless of how they compare to their peers.
- These standards will remain the same from year to year.



Choice Order of Schools Matters More in Posting



- While academic merit remains the first criterion for Secondary School posting, choice order as a new tie-breaker is designed to recognise the different considerations families have when choosing a suitable secondary school.
- If 2 students with the same PSLE Score vie for a place in a school, the following tie-breakers will be used:
- Citizenship
- Choice Order of Schools
- Computerised Balloting



Presentation of Results in Achievement Levels (ALs)



 Starting from the 2020 Primary Five (P5) cohort, school-based examination results of P5 and P6 students will be presented in ALs to help familiarise them with the new scoring system.

Information on Secondary Schools' indicative Cut-Off Points (COPs) will be provided in AL terms in the first half of 2021. These AL COPs will be derived from the PSLE scores and choice patterns of the 2020 Secondary 1 (S1) posting exercise.

Scoring for Foundation Level Subjects

(New) Supporting Students and Parents in Making Subject Choices



- Foundation level subjects support students who require additional help to build up strong fundamentals, giving them confidence to learn at a pace and level suited to them.
- Foundation level subjects will be graded AL A to AL C under the new scoring system.

- Students' PSLE Score will be the sum of the four AL scores of all Standard and Foundation subjects they take.
- For S1 posting, Foundation level subject scores will be converted to the equivalent standard level subject scores before the total score is calculated.

Eligibility for Sec Sch Higher Mother Tongue Language (HMTL)



 Students who are eligible for HMTL in Secondary Schools will be based off the criteria below.

Criteria Under The New Scoring System

PSLE Score of 8 or better
OR

PSLE Score of 9 to 14 inclusive; and AL1/AL2 in MTL or Distinction/Merit in HMTL

 Secondary schools have the flexibility to offer HMTL to students, if they are assessed to have high ability and interest in MTL, and are able to take HMTL without affecting their performance in other subjects.



3 Calculating PSLE score and course placement

Your child's PSLE score will be the sum of the four AL scores across their Standard and Foundation level subjects. The PSLE score ranges from 4 to 32, with 4 being the best possible total score.

Your child will be placed in Group 1, 2 or 3 based on ther PSLE score. They will be able to take all subjects in secondary school at the level they are placed at*

* Students who progress to Group 1 must score at least an AL7 in both English and Mathematics. This criterion is not applicable to all other secondary courses.

4 Subject-Based Banding eligibility in secondary school

Subject-Based Banding (SBB) in secondary school recognises and develops students' subject-specific strengths, and provides them with opportunities to reach their fullest potential.

SBB allows eligible N(A) and N(T) students to take selected subjects at a more demanding level at Secondary 1, based on their AL scores for individual subjects rather than the overall PSLE score.*



New PSLE Scoring System

The revised PSLE scoring system in 2021 will help your child focus on their learning instead of how they compare to others.



The PSLE is a useful checkpoint to gauge your child's understanding of key concepts and academic strengths. This will help your child learn at a suitable pace when they progress to secondary school.

Changes made to the PSLE scoring system from 2021 will reflect your child's level of achievement through scoring bands.



If your child is exempted from taking Mother Tongue Language, or is considering taking Higher Mother Tongue Language in secondary school, you can find out more via the PSLE-FSBB microsite or reach out to the school.

INDICATIVE PSLE SCORE RANGES

 - Data was taken from students' PSLE results and school choice patterns at the 2021 S1 Posting Exercise.
- Similar to the T-score system, the school's PSLE Score range for a particular year is not pre-determined, and may vary from year to year, depending on the cohort's PSLE results and their school choices in the previous year's S1 Posting Exercise.
- This is a guide to shortlist school choices.
- Consider Indicative Score ranges alongside other factors, e.g. the school's programmes, culture, ethos, Co- Curricular Activities, and proximity to home

Similar to the T-score system, the indicative PSLE Score range refers to the PSLE Score of the first and last student admitted into a particular school in the previous year via S1 Posting. This shows the range of student profiles who enter each school.

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GOOD SPREAD OF SCHOOLS WITH A RANGE OF CUT-OFF POINTS (COPS)

- The COP refers to the PSLE Score of the last student admitted to a particular school in the 2020 S1 Posting Exercise.
- As COPs vary from school to school, the COP ranges would differ across zones.#

^{*}This indicates that the last student posted to the school had a PSLE Score better than 30. The school's COP is 30 because the school still had Group 1 vacancies after the S1 Posting Exercise. Hence, students with PSLE Score of 30 and had met the eligibility criteria for progression to S1 would have been able to obtain a place in the school if they had chosen the school during the S1 Posting Exercise.



^{*}Schools offering both IP and O-Level track are counted as 1 school while the COP range includes COP of IP-track.



EXAMPLE OF AN SAP SCHOOL'S INDICATIVE PSLE SCORE RANGE

While students need not take HCL to enter SAP schools, students who pass HCL receive a posting advantage for admission. To reflect this, the indicative PSLE Score ranges of SAP schools include the HCL grades of the first and last student admitted in the previous year via S1 Posting.


HCL posting advantage for entry to SAP schools

• Students' HCL results will be denoted as 'D' (Distinction), 'M' (Merit)

or 'P' (Pass).

• Students will be ranked taking into account their performance in HCL.

- This posting advantage applies before the tie-breakers for S1 Posting.
- Students need not take HCL to enter SAP schools. Those who do receive a posting advantage for admission.

CHOICE ORDER of schools will matter more

- Students continue to have six choices in selecting their secondary schools.
- Students will be posted to a secondary school based on <u>academic</u> merit, i.e. PSLE Score, and their <u>school choice rank order</u>.
- If two students with the same PSLE Score vie for the last remaining place in a school, the following tie-breakers will be used in the following order:
 - 1. CITIZENSHIP



- 2. CHOICE ORDER OF SCHOOLS
- 3. COMPUTERISED BALLOTING

The new tie-breaker based on school choice order recognises the different considerations that families have in making school choices.







Full Subject-Based Banding (FSBB)





What are the changes?

- Mixed form classes at lower secondary
- Students can take subjects at **three subject levels**, known as G1, G2, G3 (G stands for General), mapped from today's N(T), N(A) and Express standards respectively
- All secondary school students can offer English Language, Mother Tongue Languages, Mathematics and Science at a more demanding level from the start of Secondary One based on students' PSLE Achievement Level (AL) for each subject
- Students in schools that are implementing Full SBB will also be able to offer Humanities subjects (Geography, History, and Literature in English) at a more demanding level from Secondary Two.

Applying for CHIJ SJC, using the Affiliation Priority





Eligibility for Affiliation Priority IF:

- Meet the affiliate minimum requirement (AMR) set by CHIJ St Joseph's Convent; <u>and</u>
- Indicate CHIJ St Joseph's Convent as her first choice at Secondary 1
 Posting

Course	AL AMR(s)	2021 PSLE Score Range (Affiliate)	2021 PSLE Score Range (Non-affiliate)
Group 3	20	8 - 20	7 - 14
Group 2	25	21 - 24	21 - 22
Group 1	30 with AL7 or better in both EL and Maths	26 - 28	25 - 27





There is no change to affiliation policy in the new PSLE Scoring and S1 Posting systems

- Affiliation priority and meeting the AMRs do <u>not</u> guarantee admission into the affiliated secondary school:
 - Subject to child indicating affiliate school as <u>first choice</u> at S1 Posting and the <u>availability</u> of vacancies in the school
 - If the demand from affiliates exceeds the available vacancies for affiliates, they will be posted by merit based on their PSLE scores
- Sec schools reserve 20% of the places in each course (Groups 1 /2 /3 for students who do not benefit from affiliation priority





Please note:

- If your child's PSLE score meets CHIJ St Joseph Convent's AMR and she wants to be considered for affiliation priority, she must indicate the affiliated secondary school as first choice.
- If your child prefers other non-affiliated schools instead, she should rank them ahead of CHIJ St Joseph Convent.
- If CHIJ St Joseph Convent is her 2nd 6th choice, your daughter will <u>not</u> be considered for affiliation priority. She will be considered for admission together with non-affiliated applicants since the affiliated secondary school is not his/her first choice.
- Applications to an affiliated school does not guarantee a place. Posting is subject to Cut-Off Point if insufficient places available. No change from previous years.





Can I appeal to enter the affiliated secondary school if my child is not posted there?

- Parents are strongly encouraged to allow their child to settle down in their posted school, so as not to disrupt the child's learning as schools may not have available vacancy to take in appeals
- As with all other students, those with serious medical conditions may appeal to MOE for a transfer
- Students who wish to appeal for a school transfer on other grounds may approach their school of choice directly
- Schools with available vacancies may consider the child only if the child's PSLE score has met the school's COP for that year's S1 Posting:
 - For eligible affiliates who indicated the affiliated secondary school as her first choice, this would be the affiliate COP
 - For eligible affiliates who <u>did not</u> indicate the affiliate secondary school as her first choice, this would refer to the non-affiliate COP



Sec 1 Posting: Appeal for transfer

- Students who wish to put in an appeal due to serious medical reasons
 / Impairment are to apply through posted secondary school the day
 after release of posting results
 - MOE will consider the appeal on a case-by-case basis
 - Outcome will be made known to applicants in early Jan through the posted secondary school
- Students who are seeking a transfer due to non-medical reasons should check the secondary school's website for information on the appeal process. Note:
 - Strictly by Cut-Off Points (COP) and school-based criteria.
 - Need not to ask for testimonials.

Admin details to keep in mind

- The 2023 PSLE Certificates will be issued to students today i.e.
 Wednesday 22 November 2023
- The PSLE result slips and certificates will be printed with the same personal particulars maintained in iEXAMS2 as of 31 October 2023.
 - There is an administrative fee of **\$\$50.00** (inclusive of **GST**) for the amendment of each PSLE certificate.
 - The amended PSLE certificate will be issued to the school by 12 January 2024.
- There will be no reprinting or replacement of lost or damaged certificates.



Admin details to keep in mind

- Appeal of a review of results: Applications must be submitted to SEAB via CHIJ OLN by 28 November 3:00 pm. There is an appeal fee of \$\$53.50 per subject (inclusive of GST). Outcome release: within 5 weeks after appeal deadline through IJOLN.
- Submission of school choices: Wednesday 22 Nov, 11.30am Tues 28 Nov, 3p.m. through MOE's S1 Posting website at www.moe.gov.sg/s1-posting.
- Release of S1 Posting Results: between 20 December 22 December through these channels:
 - Short Message Service (SMS) via a local mobile number (if provided by the applicant during the application process);
 - S1-IS using the student's Birth Certificate number / FIN, and the S1 PIN; or
 - At CHIJ OLN, after 8:30am.





Reporting to Secondary Schools

- All posted PSLE students (including those who are admitted via DSA-Sec) will report to the posted secondary schools when schools re-open on 2 January. Please visit the posted secondary school's website to find out:
 - Reporting arrangements (when school reopens in January)
 - Student and parent familiarisation activities
 - Online purchase of new uniforms and textbooks
- Students who are unable to report to the posted secondary school on the first day of school due to valid reasons, should contact the posted secondary school for assistance.
- Parents will receive instructions from posted secondary school via PG after the posting results have been released.



Financial Assistance

- Do submit application to CHIJ OLN by 30 November so that secondary schools will know of approved cases and can make the necessary arrangements for the collection of the uniforms and textbooks.
